# Celebrating 250 Years of History of Women in the Military

Women have served with, and in, the military since the Revolutionary War, although until World War I, they were many times forced to disguise their true identity. Once America entered the "War to end all wars" women were finally allowed to serve as clerks, radio operators and telephone swithc board operators. More women joined the military as nurses during this time as well. With the attack on Pearl Harbor the role of women in the military exploded, with women now flying aircraft, serving as instructors, and ultimately workingh on Top Secret projects such as the

"Bombe" decoding machine developed and built in Dayton.

With the Korean War and Vietnam War, the role of women continued to expland to a certain degree. However, while there were women's organizations as part of the military (WACs, WAVES, and WAFs) they were not allowed to serve in combat or command men. Pregnancy was the cause for involuntary discharge.

By the end of the Vietnam War, many of these restrictions were lifted, with the exception of the ability to serve in combat roles. This was essentially a moot point as the nature of warfare began to change. From the invasion of Panama and Grenada to Operation DESERT STORM women took on leadership roles in combat, even though technically not allowed to do so.

After September 11<sup>th</sup>, virtually all restrictions for female service members were done away with. In environments where there are essentially no front lines, and dealing with insurgencies made any such restriction useless.

Throughout the past 250 years women have gone from serving in secret to leading their services as 4-star Generals and Flag Officers; their journey fraught with stereotypes, chauvinism, and at times plain ignorance. They've overcome these obstacles and shown they have always been up to the task of preserving and defending the freedoms we all enjoy today.

# 2024 Annual Report Summary

(Other than usual and customary museum practices)

Total Volunteers (Ad Hoc and Core): 37 Core Volunteers: 13

Total service-connected disabled veterans (Ad Hoc and Core volunteers): 49%

Total service-connected disabled veterans (Core volunteers only): 92%

## **Service to Veterans:**

- Provided uniforms, insignia and medals to the Next of Kin (NoK) to fulfill the dying wish of their veteran loved one to be buried in uniform.
- Submitted medal requests to the National Military Personnel Records Center for veterans and their families typically a 12 month+ process; in the case of advanced-age veterans we provided them their awards in case they were to die before receiving the ones ordered from St. Louis.
- Provided guidance to veterans and dependents on filing claims and appeals with the Department of Veterans Affairs, and put them in touch with Nationally Accredited Service Officers.
- Volunteers drove veterans to their VA compensation and pension exams, as well as the Dayton VA Medical Center to register for their health care benefits.
- Volunteers visited the Dayton VA hospice center on a weekly basis, providing snacks and fellowship. Fulfilled unique requests from patients. For example, an Army veteran who served as a Drill Instructor asked if we had a Drill Instructor "Smokey the Bear" hat for his room, and one was provided within two days. Another patient loved Skittles candy; the museum supplied them every day until his passing.
- Volunteers provided complete Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners to the Hospice patients, families and staff, as well as Christmas gift bags for the patients on the VA dialysis ward. The museum also provided magazines and books for the patients.
- Museum provided new cooking utensils, pots, pans etc. to the VA hospice, which had none, as well as craft supplies for the Recreational Therapist's programs.

#### **Service to the community:**

- Supported the local FISH food pantry with a donation bin to collect food for local families.
- Supported the Marine Corps Toys for Tots program, collecting enough toys to fill four boxes.
- Made our building available to support the "Fairborn Fly Zone" during each Air Force marathon.
- Provided meeting space for the Fairborn Military Veterans Memorial Project, the Fairborn Military Veterans Coalition and the American Allied Veterans and Supporters (AAVS.)
- Each quarter, volunteers placed new "Medal of Honor Recipient" flags on the graves of the five Medal of Honor recipients buried at the Dayton National Cemetery and new U.S. flags in the veterans memorial section.
- Memorial Day weekend sponsored the third annual Military History Muster, a free 2-day public event with reenactors, military vehicles and weapons, as well as heritage and lineage groups.
- Monthly public Speakers Series where various people and organizations discuss different aspects of military history and/or their organizational missions.
- Official Partner of the United States Vietnam 50th Commemoration and aggressively supported their programs; hosted a Vietnam Pinning Ceremony to give Vietnam and Vietnam-era veterans and their families a long overdue "Thanks you, and Welcome Home." We have presented more than 2,500 lapel pins to date.
